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## Colossians 3:18-4:1 (ESV)

- <sup>18</sup> Wives, submit to your husbands, as is fitting in the Lord.
- <sup>19</sup> Husbands, love your wives, and do not be harsh with them.
- <sup>20</sup> Children, obey your parents in everything, for this pleases the Lord.
- <sup>21</sup> Fathers, do not provoke your children, lest they become discouraged.
- <sup>22</sup> Bondservants, obey in everything those who are your earthly masters, not by way of eye-service, as people-pleasers, but with sincerity of heart, fearing the Lord.
- <sup>23</sup> Whatever you do, work heartily, as for the Lord and not for men,
- <sup>24</sup> knowing that from the Lord you will receive the inheritance as your reward. You are serving the Lord Christ.
- <sup>25</sup> For the wrongdoer will be paid back for the wrong he has done, and there is no partiality.
- <sup>1</sup> Masters, treat your bondservants justly and fairly, knowing that you also have a Master in heaven.

"Paul refers to the constant nagging or belittling of a child ... the refusal to allow children to be people in their own right instead of carbon copies of their parents or their parents' fantasies. Children treated like this became 'discouraged' or 'dispirited': hearing continually, both verbally and non-verbally, that they are of little value, they come to believe it, and either sink down in obedient self-hatred or over-react with boastful but anxious self-assertion. The parents' duty is, in effect, to live out the gospel to the child: that is, to assure their children that they are loved and accepted and valued for who they are, not for who they ought to be, should have been, or might (if only they would try a little harder) become."
